When we got back to our classroom, Mr. O'Reilly made a speech and told us how amazing all of our projects were and how we should all be very proud. After school, we went to Lana in Ennis with some of our friends to celebrate and we all got ice cream and dinner. It was so much fun! The next stage will be the regionals in Shannon in a month or so. 














Carol singing
















Sixth class Ice skating

>>> Third class constructions

On Monday the 4th of December we started our wooden crib projects in third class. One of the parents, Bernie O'Driscoll, came to help us. She brought a drill, screwdrivers, the wood and some nails. We are making one crib each. The first step was to sand down the pieces of wood. Some of the 6th class came to help us while we were working. They helped us to screw in the nails and to use the drills. We all had a piece of wood for the bottom, the back part and two pieces for the roof. One piece of the roof was longer than the other, and we had to line them up to make the roof shape. We assembled our cribs and drilled all of the pieces into place. We then sanded the cribs some more to make them nice and smooth.

The day after we began making the crib figures. We are making baby Jesus, Mary, Joseph, the three shepherds, the three wise men and some animals. To make the figures we mixed 400 grams of plaster of paris with water and this made a paste. You have to let it sit for a while and then stir it with a spoon. You then pour the plaster into the moulds and you let it set for about an hour. When they are set, you take them out of the moulds and then you can decorate them. We will also be adding straw, moss and bark to our cribs to make it like the Nativity scene. We have really enjoyed making the cribs and our favourite parts were using the drills and decorating our cribs. We would like to thank Bernie for all of her help and for providing the materials.




This newsletter is a look back at some of the events of the past term as seen by the pupils. More photos of these events can be seen on our website.
